Genesis 28:10-19a

Jacob's Dream at Bethel

Jacob left Beersheba and set out for Harran. When he reached a certain place, he stopped for the night because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones there, he put it under his head and lay down to sleep. He had a dream in which he saw a stairway resting on the earth, with its top reaching to heaven, and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. There above it stood the Lord, and he said: "I am the Lord, the God of your father Abraham and the God of Isaac. I will give you and your descendants the land on which you are lying. Your descendants will be like the dust of the earth, and you will spread out to the west and to the east, to the north and to the south. All peoples on earth will be blessed through you and your offspring. I am with you and will watch over you wherever you go, and I will bring you back to this land. I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you."

When Jacob awoke from his sleep, he thought, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I was not aware of it." He was afraid and said, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God; this is the gate of heaven."

Early the next morning Jacob took the stone he had placed under his head and set it up as a pillar and poured oil on top of it. He called that place Bethel, though the city used to be called Luz.

Romans 8:12-25 New International Version (NIV)

Therefore, brothers and sisters, we have an obligation—but it is not to the flesh, to live according to it. For if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live.

For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. The Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again; rather, the Spirit you received brought about your adoption to sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father." The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. Now if we are children, then we are heirs—heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory.

Present Suffering and Future Glory

I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. For the creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed. For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God.

We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time. Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption to sonship, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently.

Homily by Keith Albans

Gen 28¹⁶ "Surely the Lord is in this place – and I did not know it!"

One of my favourite pieces of Old Testament logic comes in Joshua chapter 4. After crossing the Jordan, twelve stones are set up in Gilgal. And why? Simply so that in years to come children will ask their parents why the stones are there! A bit like tying a knot in your hanky in the hope that you will remember something – even if you're not sure what it is.

Jacob similarly sets up a stone in today's OT story – it's the one he'd used as a pillow at the place he had his ladder dream. And as he makes his dramatic declaration that God is in this place, the pillow becomes a pillar which he anoints with oil and names the place Bethel – the house of God.

When we lived in Heworth in the 1980's we had a cat – Big Thana (named after a eunuch in the book of Esther). He would happily walk with us round towards Church, but he always stopped at the last house. This far but no further – we had reached the end of his territory – but two hours later as we walked home, he was still there, waiting for us. In many ways the stories of the Old Testament include a series of discoveries about the extent of the divine territory – of where God is willing to be encountered.

Mountains form a common thread of God's topography – Abraham and Moses both show us that. But in a land marked by the deep scar of the Dead Sea, the depths also show God's presence. In Psalm 130, the Psalmist isn't convinced, and rather assumes God's absence – "Out of the depths I cry to you O Lord, Lord hear my voice!" But a few verses later, the writer is reassured and his waiting is rewarded and he knows God is with him, even in the depths.

Height and depth – sorted. But what about reach? Again, a problem at first, particularly for the people in exile. What's the point of singing the songs of Zion in a strange land? God can't hear us... Rather like Jonah assuming that if he sailed to Spain, he's be out of God's sight... but for both Jonah and the exiles, experience proved otherwise, and the encounter with God and the awareness of God's all-pervading presence takes hold... And in Psalm 139, the impossibility of falling out of God's presence is celebrated, alongside God's absolute and intimate knowledge of us. All of which is wonderful, and important to proclaim and have at the heart of our spiritual memory bank.

But it doesn't mean it always feels like that does it. One of things people have done since the times of Jacob and Joshua is to make those stone pillars into places of pilgrimage, then add a shrine where offerings could be made, and then add a building where services could be held. Special places where God is known to be present and can be met. Just the sort of places we have been prevented from meeting one another and from meeting God for these four long months... And for all that we've been creative in putting our online services together, and perhaps via Zoom we have enjoyed looking at people's faces instead of the backs of their heads, it does lack the sense of the numinous doesn't it – as far removed from the vision of Isaiah 6 with trains filling temples as can be imagined...

And yet... and yet... it is precisely that deprivation which has led us and perhaps enabled us to discover, with Jacob, that God is in places we'd never have imagined – and that is pretty awesome.

I am not designed for caving... but about 25 years ago when I was living in Sheffield a group from my Church were going into one of the publicly accessible caves in the Peak District – and I went. Contorting the body to negotiate narrow squeezes was interesting – and I surprised myself and a few others. But I chose to opt out of the final one and stayed on my own while the rest of the party went on. And I turned my head lamp off, and there I was in total absolute darkness, all alone... it was amazing, and the Lord was in that place.

I wonder where you may have had similar realisations – particularly in these past weeks? I sense God's presence most strongly in places which take me out of myself – big waterfalls, crashing waves, wide vistas, clear night skies... those places are awesome!

Celtic spirituality speaks of thin places – meaning places which feel as though they belong as much to the realm of heaven as they do to that of earth. Thin places can also speak of times when we are living on rations, unable to access the normal sources of spiritual nourishment on which we usually rely. In his account of being held hostage for 5 years in Lebanon, Terry Waite writes of drawing on what was within him – his religious memory bank – in order to maintain his sense of who he was as a person loved by God, even in the awfulness of solitary confinement. Our current confinements may be solitary, albeit in very different conditions, but the memories of meeting God in familiar places can similarly sustain us in the unfamiliar circumstances of Covid19 lockdown.

Writing to the Church in Rome, Paul doesn't try to underplay the nature of the difficult times in which they were living. Rather he recognises that such difficulties are part of the imperfect in-between times in which we live, and he offers us the hope and reassurance that God is active and present within creation, working to bring about that which is yet to be... and his word to them, and to us, is to wait with patience...

In my last job I was a frequent user of Premier Inn's hotels. In the rooms there was always one of those surveys to fill in, and they seemed particularly keen to have your feedback on their pillows... I wonder how Jacob would have responded! "A bit hard at first... but I must

have slept well because I had a fantastic dream – ladders, angels and divine promises of land and descendants beyond number. It was awesome – surely the Lord was in this place!" Not sure what the management would make of that.

Wherever we are sharing in this service, and wherever this next week may take us, may we know that we are and we will be on holy ground – for God's promised presence will be with us.

We pray for the scientists, whose wisdom and commitment give us hope that a cure may be found in the not-too distant future. Give strength to their efforts, Lord, and reward for their dedication. We also ask that you give wisdom to our politicians helping to discern a safe path towards the return of normal life throughout the world. Normal life which we must never again take for granted in forgetting your love for us set in your wonderful creation.
