Gospel Reading: Matthew 20:1-16

The Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard

20 "For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire workers for his vineyard.² He agreed to pay them a denarius^[a] for the day and sent them into his vineyard.

³ "About nine in the morning he went out and saw others standing in the marketplace doing nothing. ⁴ He told them, 'You also go and work in my vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' ⁵ So they went.

"He went out again about noon and about three in the afternoon and did the same thing. ⁶ About five in the afternoon he went out and found still others standing around. He asked them, 'Why have you been standing here all day long doing nothing?'

⁷ "Because no one has hired us,' they answered.

"He said to them, 'You also go and work in my vineyard.'

⁸ "When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Call the workers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last ones hired and going on to the first.'

⁹ "The workers who were hired about five in the afternoon came and each received a denarius. ¹⁰ So when those came who were hired first, they expected to receive more. But each one of them also received a denarius. ¹¹ When they received it, they began to grumble against the landowner. ¹² 'These who were hired last worked only one hour,' they said, 'and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the work and the heat of the day.'

¹³ "But he answered one of them, 'I am not being unfair to you, friend. Didn't you agree to work for a denarius? ¹⁴ Take your pay and go. I want to give the one who was hired last the same as I gave you. ¹⁵ Don't I have the right to do what I want with my own money? Or are you envious because I am generous?'

¹⁶ "So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

The Homily – Mark Poole

"It's not fair!" Or "It's not fair!" if I follow my Lancastrian roots! This is just what you can hear those workers saying who were hired first in the parable we have just heard. "It's not fair!" And it **does** seem understandable. It seems crazy that the owner should hire at dawn and then carry on returning to the marketplace searching out and hiring for another four times throughout the day, the last being at five O clock. Why didn't he just hire in one job lot, wouldn't that have made more business sense? And then, just one hour later all the workers are gathered and those who have toiled all day enduring the heat and fatigue are paid the same as those who have only put in an hour's stint! Surely, the wages earned should have been calculated proportionally and according to merit, what is deserved. It's outrageous! "It's not fair!"

But of course, Jesus is telling this parable, and, he is describing the kingdom of heaven. Jesus used this very familiar scenario of workers gathering, waiting to be hired, working

honestly and then being paid their earnings accordingly and turned it upside down. It was transformed into a picture of what the Kingdom of God is *really* like. And it is *outrageously* different to what the Jews of his time thought it *must* be like. On hearing this parable, they would probably have been falling about laughing at the absurdity and foolishness of the landowner. It just didn't make sense! But Jesus is completely serious. In fact, he is being deliberately upsetting and disturbing. He is describing the very heart of God the Father and it challenges and reverses conventional values including the sense of what is fair. It is not what they had imagined at all......

Jesus is illustrating that the love of God is not something that can be earned or gained on merit. It is not something that we receive from him based on a calculation in relation to how good we are, how hard we work or how long we have been working for the Lord. It is not based on a human economy of what is deemed to be right, just and fair. The love of God is unreasonably, outrageously, foolishly and generously lavished upon us all......whatever our creed or colour, whatever our background or past experience, whatever our weaknesses and imperfections. We call this, the grace of God. The unmerited and undeserving favour of God, freely offered to us all in equal and outrageous abundance. And the grace of God cannot be earned, **only received** because God is so glad to give it. The grace of God is not exclusive only to people who are good, who never make mistakes, who never fall into temptation. The grace of God is for the weak, the broken and the imperfect like me. God's grace floods our days in the desert with streams of living water. God's grace is an ocean without a shoreline. God's grace is persistent and powerful. The grace of God doesn't turn away from us, rather turns towards us. Even when we feel discouraged by our mistakes or think we are no good or have nothing to offer, the grace of God comes looking for us. Looking for us just as the landowner repeatedly, outrageously and persistently kept returning to the marketplace to seek out more workers to hire and lavish with abundant generosity.

The grace of God does not hold any record of wrongs, nor hold any grudges. The grace of God wipes the slate clean. The grace of God never gives up on us. It is perfectly undeserving. It is the source of rich blessings and new beginnings. It is the gift of reconciliation, redemption and restoration. It is the source of peace and joy. And it is available to all, whoever we are, in equal abundance.

Maybe next time we found ourselves thinking, "It's just not fair!" May we be reminded of the outrageously, undeserving generosity of the grace of God. And with humble and repentant hearts, receive, in all its fullness, God's grace, God's amazing grace. **Amen.**
