The Collect

Gospel Reading

Alleluia, alleluia.

Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,
and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.' Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord"', as the prophet Isaiah said.

Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, 'Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' John answered them, 'I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

John 1.6-8, 19-28

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon

'In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.'

The reading for this third Sunday of Advent focusses on John the Baptist. I wonder what you heard?

There are two things I want to consider. The first is the light and that John is a witness to this light, and the second, John's rather elusive and intriguing response when questioned about who he was by the Jewish authorities. For me, this passage is sizzling with significance and is both profound and powerful.

So firstly, concerning the Light and John's witness. This passage is part of the Gospel writer's introduction, and is so unlike the other gospels, with no mention of a manger, angels, shepherds and kings. Instead the writer gets right to the heart of the mystery and wonder of who God is in Jesus Christ, the Light of the world. The God *beyond* time is becoming God *in* time; the cosmic and eternal reality of God becomes the incarnate and temporal; the distant, unreachable, 'out of this worldness' of God becomes wedded to the concrete, earthly and human; divinity is united with humanity; the Word becomes flesh.

This is *the most* decisive event in human history, because the relationship between divine and human is transformed. Through Jesus Christ, God lovingly chose to pour Himself into the mess, confusion and pain of humanity.....into an intimate relationship with each one of us. God became flesh to share in the joys and the pain, suffering, loss, grief and even death of humankind. Breath-taking.

The Light came to shine in our darkness, and **John** was the witness to this Light.

And so, to John and his intriguing response to the question: 'who are you?' 'I am not the Messiah' he replied. 'Are you Elijah?' they asked. 'I am not' he answered. 'Are you the Prophet?' He replied, 'No.' John's three responses: 'I am not the Messiah.....I am not.....no.' Denial, denial, denial. The Pharisees missed the point. They wanted to know who John was, but John wanted nothing other than to prepare them to recognise who Jesus was. John pointed beyond himself.....to Jesus. By denying any claim to independent

identity, John precisely affirms his dependence on Jesus. 'I am not the Messiah.....I am not.....no.' What fills John with joy is not his own life, but Jesus'. John is not fixated on self, status, wealth, achievement, recognition and success. Instead John gives Himself up to self-abandonment and self-emptying in honour of, and to point to, the Word who became flesh and dwelt among us. John gave up any notion of 'it's all about me' so that he could open himself up to, and give space for, the love and presence of God and God's action within. John died to self to be a witness to the Light.

John the Baptist's last words recorded in John's Gospel in chapter 3 powerfully testify to this. Speaking of Jesus Christ, he says, 'He must become greater, I must become less.' These words echo those of St Paul's in his letter to the Galatians 'It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me.' Perhaps it is no wonder that in both the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, Jesus says 'there is no one greater than John.'

John was not the light. John denied self to witness to the Light, the Light who gives Himself to you and to me. The Light of the World. Our Saviour Jesus Christ. May we too, deny ourselves and become living and loving witnesses to this light, so that all may believe and have life.
