

Christmas is not cancelled

Dear Friends,

The phrase 'It'll be over by Christmas' has been around since World War 1, but it has re-emerged this year thanks to Coronavirus and the Prime Minister. Sadly the reality in 2020, as in 1914, is somewhat different and there is no doubt that it will have a profound effect on how we mark and celebrate Jesus' birth this year. But one thing is for sure – Christmas is **not** cancelled, and neither is the Good News at the heart of it any different!



Two things which I have reflected upon amongst you previously this year speak to my understanding of what we celebrate at Christmas. There was the statement from a former prisoner saying, "A lot of people can now relate to where I have been. In the same way I can now relate to their fears and insecurity." Lockdown, for all that it is hard and unwanted, has perhaps offered unexpected opportunities to empathise with the experience of others – Terry Waite has made this point out of his experience.

Similarly, on Remembrance Sunday I contrasted the modern practice of 'othering' – defining one's opponents in such a way as to separate you from them – with God's approach of 'de-othering' by being in Jesus to work for the 'at-one-ment' of all. And, for me, that begins – and perhaps ends – with the incarnation. Because this is so much more than God "relating to where we have been" or feeling empathy with the human experience – it is God becoming "flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone", or a Charles Wesley puts it, "Our God contracted to a span incomprehensibly made man."

I find in these two examples powerful illustrations of what is at the heart of the Christian gospel – what John's gospel expresses as "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth." And while this year may be a low-key and strippedback celebration, perhaps it will help us glimpse its essential truth and see a very human story of vulnerability and openness to God, of hospitality and welcome, and to living in response to government edicts. So, my prayer for us all is that the essential truth of 'God with us' will become a fresh reality that we can treasure in our hearts.

All this happened to coincide with my annual retreat, which is one of the great privileges of being a priest. Usually I would hole up somewhere like a monastery,



and enter into the rhythm of prayer and silence, but this is 2020 and not much is usual. So, with nowhere to go, I decided to take a long walk each day, either town or country, and spend time in recollection, to wonder as I wandered. Having chosen to scrap our faithful friend (and, yes, it did have a slight whiff of taking a much loved furry companion to the vet for a final visit), I made the positive choice to not mourn the loss (or be frustrated by the cost), but to celebrate a passing.

For a whole day I recalled all the family holidays over the past decade where our car had transported us, and the fun we had, often with friends or family: Skye, Wick, Ullapool and Inverness; Derry, Dublin and Dingle; Penzance, Snowdonia, Buxton and Jedburgh; Bilbao and Santander; Sienna, Florence, Assisi and Rome; and somewhere entirely forgettable in France, apparently, of which I have no memory at all - sorry!

To look back fondly on the adventures of a growing family brought great joy from a situation that may have summonsed annoyance, and I was deeply grateful. The really interesting question now is whether one can do the same for 2020? When I plot the route of memory through the year, I could count the cost, the inconvenience, the disruption and separation (though I openly admit to having travelled more unscathed than some others, and my heart truly goes out to those who have lost work or opportunity or even family), or I can count the blessings, joys, moments of grace and gift. They will all be there in the mix, and none of it is denied, but as the year draws to a close, do I choose to map the peaks or the troughs? Perhaps we know which will bring greater joy.

May this pandemic pass and the children of the earth come out to play once more. And to each and every one of you, I wish you peace and love, and a blessed New Year.

'Abiding in Christ'

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Every year churches of different denominations gather for worship and prayer between 18th and 25th January. In Dunnington we usually invite those from different denominations to share in worship together.

This year there will be an online service with Bishop Alison, Bishop of Hull as the preacher.

The sisters of the Community of Grandchamp, in Switzerland, were invited by the World Council of Churches to produce material for this year's week of prayer.

Bob Fyffe, General Secretary, Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, says of the material:

'They have offered something uniquely precious: an opportunity to engage with a form of prayer that is both very ancient and yet at the same time so apposite for our times. The ancient rhythm of prayer found in many religious orders and their traditions teach us that when we pray, we pray not just on our own or with those who share the same physical space, but with the whole Church, the Body of Christ, of Christians in other places and in different times.

Their tradition of prayer and spirituality, despite the things that hurt and separate us, invites us into shared prayer and silence together. Surely a most precious gift in troubled times. Come with us this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and enter into a place of community and blessing. Simply "be" in this place and be carried by the prayer and the reality that it is God, in Christ and through the Holy Spirit, who carries us and accompanies us. Always.'

"The Fallen" - Remembered

The Bomber Crash at Holtby (part 3). The seven RAF aircrew members who all died in this incident on 8 Sep 1942 were, like many others, brave young men flying in aircraft built only for a deadly purpose in war, and were exposed to lethal risk on every flight. Their homes were not in this village, but it was here they fell. Two more of the seven are described below – others next month.

The observer on W1228 was 123276 Pilot Officer **Arnold Robson**, age 26. He was born on 25 Nov 1915 in Tow Law, Co. Durham, to William B. Robson and his wife Laura (Walton) who had married there in 1913. Arnold joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve, and was granted an emergency commission as Pilot Officer (Observer) on 7 Mar 1942.

His home was in Howden-le-Wear, County Durham, and his body was buried in St Mary's Churchyard there. His war grave is in front of the church entrance, where the headstone bears the epitaph "Worthy of everlasting remembrance" as requested by his parents.

Arnold had a brother William; and a sister Edith who married Frederick Baker in 1942 in Chester-le-Street, had a son and a daughter, and died there in 2000. Following the crash, Arnold was posthumously promoted to substantive rank of Flying Officer on 1 Oct 1942.

778696 Sgt **Cecil Richard Rundle**, age 31, was an Air Gunner on the bomber, possibly the Rear Gunner at the tail of the aircraft. He was born on 2 Mar 1912 in Ghanzi, Botswana, Africa, and was the eldest in a family of four children born to Frank Wallis Rundle and his wife Maria Petronella (Van Niekerk) of Southern Rhodesia.

Cecil worked as a handyman. He joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve in Rhodesia, and enlisted there for war service – one of the many who came from territories overseas to fight as part of the British and Allied Forces in the Second World War.

His grave is in the war cemetery section of St Catherine's Churchyard at Barmby Moor.





The Village hall committee would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to Denby and Jill Hawkins who are retiring at the end of this year. They have been heavily involved with the running of the hall for many, many years and will be greatly missed in their current roles as Chairman/Clerk of Works and Bookings Secretary. We wish them all the very best for the future.

The position of Bookings Secretary is still vacant for 2021. Can you spare a few hours a week to help your community? If you would be interested in getting involved please get in touch. We are looking to move the village hall diary to an online bookings system so this voluntary role could be run as a job share. Expenses paid and full training will be given.

As for the hall itself the committee have been very busy behind the scenes this year. During the first lockdown the heating system boilers and control systems were replaced with an energy efficient, split room system and the asbestos was removed. This was a huge expense but has made the hall fit for many years ahead.



Ready for the reopening in June a full covid-19 risk assessment was produced and the hire agreements modified. Sanitising stations and signage has been provided throughout the hall and we even have our own venue QR code. Very sadly due to the restrictions most of the regular village societies were not able to recommence meetings in the summer but we have been ticking over with a few exercise classes, some one off bookings and the NHS Blood Donors Service who are now a regular visitor.

The diary is filling up for 2021 with all the regular village groups hoping to be able to return in the New Year, fingers crossed we will all be back together again soon.

Foil for Snappy

This year has been really difficult for everyone but throughout the pandemic my handful of volunteers and I have continued to collect the aluminium recycling from across the city to raise much needed funds for Snappy, when all their main fundraising opportunities had been cancelled. In fact recycling rates went up during the lockdown and this year we will have collected more metal recycling than in any other year so far.

At the beginning of December I launched my annual Christmas recycling campaign 'Eat the pies, Save the foil' to encourage everyone in York to recycle their mince pie cases, other aluminium foil, drinks cans, broken Christmas tree lights and household cables to help raise money for The Snappy Trust.

We know that money is very tight for lots of people, and that lots of charities are struggling, but we are hoping that people will be happy to donate their 'rubbish' to help us to help Snappy. A single mince pie case weighs less than one gram but if everyone in York saved just one mince pie case we would collect 200,000 cases which then becomes a significant amount of metal to recycle.

I read that it is estimated around 370 million mince pies will be eaten in the UK this festive season which is potentially 240 tonnes of aluminium foil pie cases that could, and should, be recycled.

The nearest outdoor collection bins are in the recycling areas at Deans Garden Centre, Sainsbury's and Asda Monks Cross. Some of the benefice churches also have collection points.



Improving our Environment and Boosting Biodiversity

The Parish Council would like to say a huge thank you to all the local volunteers who helped prepare the ground and plant a new hedge along the western edge of Dunnington Cemetery in Eastfield Lane. Our initial plan of a big working party was quickly changed to working in pairs over a much longer period to comply with Covid-19 requirements.

This project was generated by the enthusiasm of Juliet, Steve and Derek who are keen to promote more tree planting in our area. They presented some ideas at a Parish Council meeting last year and we agreed to look at the land that we owned. The Cemetery Group was tasked with taking this forward and planting is almost complete.

The Woodland Trust provided two large hedge packs free of charge – a total of 820 saplings. A Wildlife Pack plus a Year-Round Colour Pack were chosen so the range of plants includes hawthorn, dogwood, wild cherry, silver birch, rowan, hazel, blackthorn and common oak. Some saplings will also be used to in fill in the gaps on the eastern boundary hedge. In years to come these will not only provide beautiful blossoms and bright berries, they will also supply food and shelter for wildlife.

A new Yew hedge was also planted running east to west to mark out the phase two section of the cemetery. This has been funded by a Ward Grant from City of York Council.

Most of the planting was done over the weekend of 28 and 29 November and although it was a bit damp, the chat was cheery and everyone worked too hard to be cold.

We hope our efforts will inspire residents to think about planting for insects and wildlife the next time a new garden project comes to mind – and if you already do this, thank you.

Nurturing Nature on our Local Patch

Many of us have sought solace in nature during these troubled times. On our doorstep, we are lucky to have Hassacarr Nature Reserve, the Millennium Garden, Hagg Wood, Holtby Wood, our churchyards and greens, our footpaths, mature trees, and hedge-lined lanes.

At the start of National Tree Week https://

treecouncil.org.uk/, 14 volunteers (from 8-80 years of age) and a representative of Treemendous York https:// www.treemendousyork.com braved a cold and damp weekend to give a little back to nature. Working in pairs and observing recommended precautions re COVID, they set to work on two new hedges in the Cemetery at Eastfield Lane.

Extending the pre-existing hedge along the West side by 110 metres, a mixed, native, deciduous hedge of 700 saplings has been planted. The species were selected for their support for wildlife (e.g. caterpillar-food foliage, pollinator-friendly flowers and berries for birds) but will also provide year-round colour. Every 6 metres a tree will be allowed to grow up to full height. The second hedge of about 250 yew will extend from East to West covering 50 metres. As an evergreen, yew provides vital shelter through the winter. It has been agreed with the Parish Council that both hedges will be managed for wildlife.





Many thanks to Derek Utley (resident 'Woodland Creation Champion') for procuring saplings from The Woodland Trust and advising on planting arrangements, to Steve Ashby for undertaking the arduous admin and to John Eastwood for rotavating the hedge lines. Much appreciation goes to the Parish Council, especially Liz Turnbull (Parish Council Environment Group), for their enthusiasm and support, for securing a ward grant for the project and for providing a large bottle of... hand gel. We have enjoyed working together and look forward to teaming-up for future projects.

Of course, it couldn't have been done without our volunteers so a big thank you to them too.

In the near future, we hope to provide more opportunities for our residents to be involved in community-led, wildlifefriendly activities to restore and enhance our local patch for the benefit of everyone. Watch this green space...

Hassacarr Nature Reserve

The past year has been a challenging one for the Dunnington Conservation Group due to Covid restrictions; however a small group of dedicated volunteers has managed to carry out essential work to keep the reserve open to the public and for the benefit of wildlife.

This is the first year we have not had any groups of children and naturalists visiting the reserve. We had to cancel the York Ornithological Club, Dunnington Brownies and Cubs; since we started in 1993 we have had around 5,000 children at the reserve enjoying activities such as pond dipping, mini-beasts, learning about identifying wild flowers and other wildlife as well as participating in arts and crafts.

With the restrictions in place we noticed an increase in numbers of dog walkers as well as young families who seemed genuinely interested in wildlife. Their interest meant we have had to keep topping up our leaflet holders.

Breeding bird numbers were down this year; this may have been down to the increased footfall or the very dry spring. For the first time we had a pair of Spotted flycatchers nesting but unfortunately they chose to build a nest close to the boardwalk, the busiest part of the reserve (groups meeting and some people letting their dogs in the water despite the request to keep dogs on lead). This resulted in the birds abandoning the nest. Vandalism was mainly limited to the life belt, provided as a life saver, being thrown into the pond during the school holidays. On a more positive note our Tawny owls raised two young; blackcap, chiffchaff, song thrush and long tailed tit were successful; and we recorded our 21st species from the Odonata genus - a hairy dragonfly.



Other interesting wildlife recorded throughout the year included: little egret catching and eating a broad bodied chaser, a female; mallard eating a great crested newt; and a socially distanced fox and grey cat staring at one another. Kingfisher was regularly seen as were kestrel, sparrowhawk and barn owl. Butterflies had a good year as we had sightings of most of the 23 species recorded at the reserve.

Now that winter is here as you take your daily exercise around the village and reserve look out for winter thrushes such as redwing, fieldfare, blackbirds and song thrushes feeding on berries, as well as siskin and redpoll feasting on alder and silver birch seeds. Along the ditches look for water vole, snipe, little egret or the blue flash of a kingfisher.

Stay safe, stay local and respect our endangered wildlife by keeping all dogs on a lead when walking alongside hedgerows and our nature reserve.

Businesses have displayed our posters. The Newsagents have also sold our tickets, the Dunnington Reading Room Committee have enabled us to put on events in the village hall and those that work on the Grapevine and the village Facebook page have helped us by advertising our functions.

Members of the public have assisted us in a range of ways including giving donations, opening their gardens, attending our events, and helping with refreshments or to set up and clear away.

Thank you to all of you that have helped us. All monies raised from our events went directly to the NSPCC and your contributions enabled them to be there to help vulnerable children at a time of need.

I would also like to publicly thank the committee members past and present who have dedicated their time and effort to put on events and raise funds to support the charity's important work.

Unfortunately, the need for the NSPCC is still there. During lockdown, 50 children a day turned to Childline after suffering abuse and neglect.



Trees and Christmas

Trees are far older than Homo Sapiens, and clearly a lot bigger. And of course Prince Albert introduced to our country the erection of a stout green tree which reminded us of the greenery soon to reappear in our woodlands.


