Luke 2.22-40 A Mass of Candles

a reflection by Revd Nick Bird

On February 2nd it will be 40 days since Christmas, that great feast of the Incarnation: 'con carne' – with flesh. The eternal Word took on the mantel of human anatomy and joined us in our earthly venture. The human body, so it turns out, was good enough for God.

40 is a common biblical number: 40 years in the wilderness; 40 days in the desert; 40 days from resurrection to ascension. In fact, Google tells me that the number 40 is mentioned 146 times in the bible (who knew?!). One of those 40s was when Mary took Jesus to the Jerusalem temple, to be purified herself, and to present Jesus to God, and Simeon proclaims him 'A light to lighten the gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel', the whole world, in fact.

The tradition at Candlemas was to bless all the candles that will be used in the coming year, both in church and at home. Conveniently, the feast falls half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox and so the light increases and the darkness is displaced. And, as is so often the case, we do well not to push back against the movements of the natural world, as we might choose not to do against the modern world, the pagan or the cultural calendars, for divine economy and the life of the church are not coterminous. If Candlemas teaches us anything it is that God leaks!

In the same way that daylight pivots toward summer at this point in the year, so we pivot toward Easter and prepare our hearts and minds for that journey to the cross once more.
