A letter from Rev Dr John Schofield, Methodist minister at Heslington Church, Dunnington and Stamford Bridge Methodist Churches, and Methodist Chaplain at the University of York

Dear Friends,

As is always the case in December we find ourselves in the church season of Advent. This is a time to acknowledge the awesome workings of God to bring salvation in and through Christ. We consider the voice of God speaking over the centuries through the prophets and poignantly through John the Baptist, and Mary's acceptance of God's using her for divine purposes. The season in some ways is a preparation for the Christmas season which continues into January. Somehow the two seasons have become mixed up, and even in churches, carols (supposedly to be sung during the Christmas period) now dominate December, and push out the Advent hymns. I feel this is a shame because there is a power in the message of God preparing the way, although I do love carols.

My wife was asked, recently, when we put up our Christmas Tree. Her reply shocked the questioner, as she said it would go up in the second week of December. It appears most people think December 1st is when the 'decs' should be up. I write these words in the middle of November, and I am surprised I have not seen Christmas decorations and lights anywhere as yet. But I expect to see some house lights blinking in the evenings any day now. The season for such things does appear to get earlier and earlier. You could say this is a good thing, however, as Christmas for many folk ends on 25th December – and they sing the '12 Days of Christmas' without realising that it is not just one day.

Of course Christmas is a festival to mark God being born amongst us, as Emmanuel (God with us); and that is actually something we should mark every day not just in December.

It's Christmas Time



Friends,

Halloween has passed, and so, commercially speaking, this means Christmas has begun. No one is safe from tinsel and baubles until the 26th December, when, presumably, everything in the shops is taken down and another festival takes over. The only saving grace, speaking personally, is that I've not yet heard any festive songs played over a tinny tannoy, initiating a migraine-like response in my fevered brain. Yes, this is my favourite time of year.

My main issue is that we often give so much time and attention to the preparatory phase of life's milestones (and, really, I'm a big fan of feasts and festivals, saints days and seasons), that we can struggle to attend to them when they actually arrive. We hear people talk about 'living in the moment', but even in Santa-season it is quite possible to spend 60 days in anticipation, and then still manage to resent it when the day arrives. To be honest, I think it is the same for weddings, and I have advised many a couple that, should they want to actually enjoy the day, they may best keep things simple.

It can feel as though we become the *object* in the annual movements, rather than the *subject*, especially at Christmas. Things happen to us and around us, but we are divorced from the action, bystanders to the crescendos, and diminuendos in our lives, without the opportunity to observe, own and have agency in the great occurrences. Instead, we are washed along with the great flow of financial foolery, forgetting that shops and supermarkets, advertisers and salespersons do not have our best interests at heart. They do not care whether we are happy, but, are using us for commercial gain. We are sucked in then spat out, and soon become object rather than subject.

If we were subjects then we would have the freedom to stand witness to all that is happening around us; freedom to respond without compulsion or obligation. We could walk through the grotto-like shops as observers rather than purchasers. In the same way, we might find great freedom in walking through a forest, not wishing nor trying to possess all that we see. We might identify the birds and trees, naming them as we go, but with the freedom to leave them where found. Consumers are rarely free, but the subject-witness keeps their liberty, and enjoys everything, whilst dominating nothing.

I wish you all the joy and freedom of the season.



Ash - there's still life in them

We were fortunate to have a visit recently from two experts in tree health: Nicola Spencer and Amanda Mitchell, of the Farming and Environment Research Agency in nearby Sand Hutton, inspected the many ash trees in Holtby Wood which have been affected by Ash Dieback. They agreed that the policy of taking out dead trees and pruning back affected trees — some of which appeared quite healthy - was correct, and that similar large-scale experiments were taking place nation-wide, in the hope that resistant varieties would emerge. In the meanwhile we are planting saplings as replacements in the areas where ash predominate and may leave gaps. Hope springs eternal.

Password tips

Whether it's your Facebook, Amazon, or Netflix account, the explosion in popularity of online apps and services means more and more of us have to remember an increasingly long list of passwords.

Unfortunately, some of us cope with this challenge by resorting to practices that leave our data, devices and money at risk - by using the same password across multiple accounts, or by creating simple passwords that could easily be guessed by hackers.

Bad password practice is more prevalent than you might think - the UK's National Cyber Security Centre carried out analysis of passwords leaked in data breaches and found that more than 23 million users worldwide used 123456 as a password.

Here are some top tips that will make your life easier and your online accounts more secure:

- 1. Creating memorable passwords
 A good way to create strong,
 memorable passwords is by using 3
 random words. But remember, don't
 use words that can be guessed (like your
 pet's name). You can include numbers
 and symbols if you need to. For
 example, "RedPantsTree4!"
- 2. Saving passwords in your browser Saving your password in your browser means letting your web browser (such as Chrome, Safari or Edge) remember your password for you.
- **3: Email account passwords**If a hacker gets into your email account, they could:
- reset your other online account passwords
- access personal information you have saved about yourself or your business

Your email password should be strong and different to all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

Health Walks

Warthill and back - 3.4 miles

A walk from Holtby through Warthill and a return taking in Brecks Wood and Brockfield Hall.

From Holtby Church turn right down Main Street and at the bottom carefully negotiate the junction, turning right towards

Warthill. Follow this road for ½mile into Warthill. Pass the Agar Arms on the right and proceed along the main street.

After about 400m and a slight right bend in the road, find on the left a narrow sign-posted track between the houses. Cross the footbridge and emerge onto a rectangular field. The way out is through a stile across this field at '10 o'clock'. The next field is easier: cross it to exit by a style in the far corner. Negotiate what is in winter a muddy corner and bear left along a rough track skirting the fence. After 300m turn right through Brecks Wood. At the end of the wood angle left along the hedge. After another 300m this track joins the one coming from Stockton on the right. Bear left and wend your way towards Holtby for ¾ mile, passing Brockfield Hall on the right. Emerge on to Rudcarr Lane between Warthill and Holtby Lane.

Turn right, then after 300m left towards Mount Pleasant Farm. Just before you reach the farm take a gap in the hedge on the right, and turn immediately left by the side of the house. Just after the house go through a gap in the hedge and right between the hedge and a high metal fence. Take care over the style.

Continue through a metal gate, across a field towards another field towards Weir Pond House. Come out on to Holtby Lane, with Weir Pond on the right, turn left and proceed carefully over the junction back to the Village Hall.




At the time of writing the Climate Change Conference, COP26, is still convening in Glasgow. It is difficult not to be rather cynical about the difference between the statements made and the actual actions taken. This is after all the twenty sixth time the Conference has met and the progress made is a long way short of what is required. It was typically annoying to see, just one day after signing a major agreement on Deforestation, several countries backtracking on their commitment. However, we must not let these thoughts distract us from taking action at a local level. Climate Change presents many problems for our woodland with the prospect of warmer wetter winters, drier summers and more extreme weather events putting many species of flora and fauna under threat.

The rate of climate change is unprecedented, natural selection processes may not be able to keep pace, and a more active management intervention may be necessary. This will ask many questions of our group strategy. We have planted many native tree species in the past, but over recent years we have concentrated on biodiversity, creating a mix of glades and woodland. If we plant trees again, are we planting with carbon capture as a priority? Oak and maple are the best native trees for carbon capture when their whole life is taken into account (an 'average tree' sequesters about one tonne of carbon over its lifespan), but new growth conifers could be more effective in the short term. There is much contradictory advice on this topic.

One positive effect of climate change is a faster tree growth as long as water is not a constraint. Hagg Wood is naturally a low lying wet woodland, and anyone who walks in the wood in winter will know that drainage can be a persistent problem. We largely rely on the Forestry Commission for this work but do keep an eye on problems and lobby for solutions. For further study of these challenges, we recommend "Managing England's woodlands in a climate emergency" available for download on the Forestry Commission website.

THE BIRDS IN YOUR GARDEN



Jays and acorns

A phone call last week induced me to have a closer look this year's acorn crop. My main chance to see any number of oak trees close to is on the golf course, and judging by the number of squirrels looking for acorns and apparently caching them, (whilst dodging golf balls – the safest place for them being, of course, on the fairway!) I had assumed the crop to be pretty good. However, having done a bit of reading and asking around it seems that there is more to it, and in reality, the crop is rather poor.

We had a bumper acorn crop last year, an event which is generally followed by a poor one, as the trees have used up most of their resources. Which means that it is likely that the larger than usual number of Jays and squirrels currently seen is a combination of two factors. Last year's glut of food increased survival rates, whilst this year's less bountiful harvest is forcing them to compete harder to find enough food to cache. If this is true, it will be interesting to see how Jays, which rely on the acorn crop more than most, get on over the winter. We may well see more of them on our feeders, particularly in rural or semi-rural areas. Although a wary species, individual Jays can be emboldened by hunger and may become surprisingly approachable when they visit gardens.

The spring months are important for the development of most trees and shrubs. It is when the buds burst, the leaves grow, and the flowers bloom. Oak trees usually flower between the end of April and mid-

May, but as their flowers are wind pollinated, the wet weather we had last spring will have impeded pollination, and yet further reduced the acorn crop this year.

It is in autumn that Jays are at their most conspicuous in most years, hunting on the ground for the acorns which are their staple food. They can be seen collecting them, and can carry three or four in an adapted gullet plus one more held in their bills, taking them away from the immediate vicinity of the tree under which they found them, to be cached, typically in a hole that they have made in the ground with their beaks. In many years their numbers are increased by the arrival of birds from the near continent.

Jays appear to be able to relocate quite a lot of the acorns they have stored, some will be found by other birds or animals, including other corvids which have been seen watching the caching process and then raiding the store as soon as the cacher departs. Of the remainder, some will germinate to form seedlings, a good source of food for grazing animals, with

those hidden in thorny patches being protected and able to grow into trees. It is this action of burying acorns away from the tree under which they found them that makes Jays, along with squirrels, such effective dispersal agents for the seeds, helping oak woodland to establish in new areas. Other corvids do behave in the same way, though to a lesser extent

This close cooperation has, over millennia, been vital for the oak tree since, when growing closely together, the dense canopy formed prevents saplings from establishing themselves, so some form of dispersal is vital.


Squirrels, having a rather more varied diet might not fare so badly, as other nut bearing trees, such as horse chestnuts, are available for them. Time will tell, but this sort of weather variability is only going to become more common as climate change makes what are now extremes much more common.

Will we see more Jays in our gardens this winter....?
