A letter from Judith Hewitt, Reader

Dear Friends,

I am writing this letter to you, before we traditionally sing carols. I don't know about you, but Christmas Carols bring a variety of memories to me. My father liked Silent Night, I don't know why, and my mother was always pleased when she heard the Coventry Carol (Lulla luly) as music in the minor key always 'spoke' to her.

The favourite carols of family members who are no longer with us, are often those we find hard to sing or to listen to. Then there are those we feel we really must sing, or hear, on Christmas Day or at a Carol Service. There are those we can sing loudly and confidently, and those sung quietly as they are thought provoking, and of course those we really don't like!

The words of the carols traditionally hold a religious message. It maybe tells the Christmas story, or sets the scene of the events of that first Christmas.

I wonder what your favourite carol is, and why. It might be the verse of one particular carol, or it might be the tune you like.

Away in a manger is often thought of as a children's carol, but the words of the last verse are a prayer we can all pray.

Be near me, Lord Jesus; I ask Thee to stay close by me forever and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in Thy tender care, and fit us for heaven, to live with Thee there.

We sing carols every year, often without thinking about the words, or the meaning behind the words because they have become so familiar to us.

As we sing carols this Christmas, let us think carefully about the words, and the message behind them. What is God saying to us as we sing?

Christmas carols are sung until at least 5th January, when we remember the visit of the wise men, so don't stop singing them on Christmas Day.

Enjoy your Carol Singing and may the words take you into a Happy and Healthy 2022.

Walking Stoically into the New Year



Friends,

For many of us, being stoic about something is synonymous with a grim determination to continue in the face of hardship and suffering, without moaning too much. As I have been discovering recently, Stoicism is much more about freedom. The three great Stoic writers of ancient times were Marcus Aurelius (a Roman emperor), Seneca (philosopher and playwright) and Epictetus (a former slave who established his own school of philosophy). Three quite different lives, but each finding something that brought them tranquillity. So perhaps Stoicism is less grim after all.

I was interested to reflect on the ways in which the wisdom of Stoicism could be found in other traditions, particularly the Christian scriptures, on the basis that if something is true, then it should be true at all times and in all places. Stoicism is not atheist in origin, and it is certainly not Christian, but there are sure parallels, commonalities if you will – inner freedom, a certainty of identity, inoculation against the external vicissitudes of life. In brief: s**t happens, and how we choose to respond depends on our mindset and core values.

Some of the keys to living Stoically might be: Focus on what you can control; Reduce your wants; Ignore the inessential; Don't compare yourself to others; Live as if you've died and come back to life; Don't suffer imagined troubles; and, Do good to feel good. Perhaps all of these we might find echoed in the New Testament, and certainly in what some would call the Perennial Tradition.

As a new year unfolds before us, it is good to take stock, but also to set a determined course for one's own life, even if it is submission and surrender. As Seneca once wrote, 'If one does not know to which port one is sailing, no wind is favourable'.

Wishing you a happy, peaceful and fruitful New Year, and maybe a year of living Stoically.

A Quiet Space

Do you see articles about the benefits of doing meditation or relaxation and think "That's all well and good, if I could find somewhere guiet to try it out away from all the distractions of home and family!"

At St Nicholas Church we are fortunate to have both the space and some experience of doing this.

We have a retired prison chaplain who lives in our village. He worked 11 years in 3 different prisons and ran nonreligious meditation groups for the prisoners, working with the Prison Phoenix Trust. https:// www.theppt.org.uk These were very popular as the prisoners found them very helpful.

We also have a retired Occupational Therapist who used to teach relaxation techniques as part of her work.

Whilst we have been running monthly Christian Meditation sessions at St Nicholas Church for several years now, we thought that we would now like to offer a secular, non-religious course as an introduction to engaging in this beneficial practice.



Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th to 25th January

The Service at St Nicholas, at 10.30am on Sunday 23rd January will celebrate Christian Unity and will also include the Methodist Covenant Service.

The story of the Magi visiting the Holy Family in Bethlehem is one very familiar to us. The Magi have sometimes been seen as a symbol of the world's diversity – different religions and cultures – that comes to pay homage to the Christ-child. The story might therefore represent the unity of all created that God desires.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2022 has been prepared by the churches of the Middle East, the history of which was, and still is, characterised by conflict and strife, tainted with blood and darkened by injustice and oppression. The Christians of the Middle East offer these resources conscious that the world shares many of the travails and much of the difficulties that it experiences, and yearns for a light to lead the way to the Saviour who is the light that overcomes darkness.

Serving the Gospel today requires a commitment to the human being, especially the poorest, the weakest and those marginalised. It requires from the churches transparency and accountability in dealing with the world, and with each other. This means churches need to cooperate to provide relief to the afflicted, to welcome the displaced, to relieve the burdened, and to build a just and honest society. This is a call for churches to work together so that young people can build a good future according to God's heart, a future in which all human beings can experience life, peace, justice, and love.



Health Walks: Doubling up

The Tuesday Health Walks are all about three and a half miles and take about one and a half hours, starting and finishing at the Cross Keys. This is a good healthy distance and a good time for most people, but occasionally we offer the opportunity to do a little more or a little less.



In November we all walked together to the end of Hagg Lane, where walkers were given the option of going back through Hagg Wood, or taking a detour round the Scoreby estate. The numbers were roughly even, the pace a little more brisk for the first group, who arrived back at the Cross Keys at 12 noon, the second group about 12.15. There's no question of physical superiority, simply a way of satisfying individual preferences.

Greening Holtby Lane

York, New City Beautiful, Toward an Economic Vision is a report written in 2010 for City of York Council, in which a consultant recommended that tree planting, especially along the approach roads, would make York a healthier, greener, more sustainable place, likely to attract economic growth in the areas of industry, education and tourism.

Councillor Mark Warters and two Treemendous volunteers - Micki Storey and Derek Utley - recently added a small step to the many we have already taken down this path.

The new sites were on the verges on Holtby Lane, at the turning to Murton. The verges were recently cleaned up in preparation for 4 medium-sized oak trees and 75 saplings - 25 each of 3 native species: hazel, cherry and silver birch.

We hope that not only will this previously scruffy-looking site improve as the trees grow, but they will also add to the carbon capture, biodiversity and wild life which we hear is a major factor in avoiding the ecological crises currently threatening us.

This won't save the planet, but it's another step in the right direction.

Dunnington Green Initiatives Group, including the indefatigable Derek Utley (of Treemendous York), braved very windy, wintry weather at the end of November to provide residents with attractive, wildlife-friendly trees for their gardens. Many others helped to promote the scheme, whether publishing our posts & articles, e-mailing community group members, putting up posters or telling their friends. Finally, a huge thank you to those residents who took us up on the offer, stepped up for the environment and made a positive contribution towards making our village even more beautiful. We hope you enjoy your trees for many years.

The Autumn colours on the leaves seem to have been especially stunning in Hagg Wood this year and what a pleasure it has been to walk around the wood swishing through a thick covering of fallen leaves. Storm Arwen arrived with a vengeance at the end of November and removed the last of the leaves that were bravely hanging on to the broadleaf trees.

Forestry Commission contractors are planning to thin out some of the more mature conifers in the coming weeks. They may even have begun this work by the time this article is read. This is a regular practice and the extra light that gets through to the surrounding areas benefits not only the remaining trees, but also the ground cover, increasing the flora, in the following months.

The display of fungi in Hagg Wood has also been abundant this year. There is always something new to see on a visit to the wood. Sometimes when the colder wetter weather arrives at this time of the year, it can be difficult to become motivated to take a walk in Hagg Wood, but if you make that effort you will be rewarded with a sense of appreciation of the amazing nature that is free to enjoy without having to travel too far. It is well known that such a walk can have enormous benefits for our mental wellbeing.


In the next few weeks the first snowdrops will be appearing; the best area to see them is near the notice board at the bottom of the Stone Road. Regular walkers in Hagg Wood will probably remember when the Forestry Commission contractors resurfaced the Stone Road a few years ago. Initially it looked so stark and so urban, but in the following months and years Nature gradually reclaimed the edges. It is now probably less than half its previous width, with grass, wild flowers and shrubs creeping back. THE BIRDS IN YOUR GARDEN

Reed Buntings

Not really a garden bird you may think, but increasingly Reed Buntings are being seen in gardens in mid-winter when food is short elsewhere, particularly those in less urban areas or near rivers and lakes. They are predominantly a wetland bird, typically found in wet vegetation but they have more recently spread onto farmland and, in winter, into gardens.

Reed Bunting abundance has fluctuated without a clear trend since the 1980s with British Trust for Ornithology results showing a population increase in northeastern England since 1995. An initial decline in the 80s pushed the species onto the red list but latterly, with evidence of some recovery in numbers, it was moved from red to amber.

The Reed Bunting is a medium-sized member of the bunting family, with a large-headed, thick-necked appearance. Although the male is unmistakable in its breeding season plumage of black head with broad white collar and white moustachial stripe, they are most commonly seen in gardens outside the breeding season, when identification becomes more difficult(!) They are camouflaged by fresh warm-buff feather tips that will gradually be worn away to reveal their distinctive black plumage in time for spring and the breeding season. The buff stripe above the eye, known as the supercilium, and the grey-brown crown and cheeks are still useful in identification though, as is the boldly

marked back. If you only get a quick glance, they can easily be confused with a sparrow, which is much the same size, but a second look will tell you that you've seen something a bit different. The longer tail and rather brighter colours are the give-away.

Despite its name, the Reed Bunting breeds across a range of habitats from reedbeds and conifer plantations to hedgerows and arable crops. They particularly like oil seed rape for finding food and nesting. During the nonbreeding season, they are dependent upon weed seeds, and as such used to join other species in winter flocks on farmland stubbles, when they still existed. Their decline, due to mainly changes in farming practices, matches that of other farmland species such as Tree Sparrows and Linnets, and their increasing winter use of gardens almost certainly is a result of the decrease in availability of winter food. In the breeding season they are mainly insectivorous, and like many other species rely upon the ever-decreasing number of insects to provide high protein food for their young.

During the winter months, large flocks of Reed Buntings may gather to roost. These flocks prefer wet or marshy areas and often roost communally in reedbeds, where they are at less risk from predators – whether these flocks roam around and might end up in someone's garden I don't know – but we can always hope.



Male Reed Buntings usually establish breeding territories in the same area as the year before, with nest building left to the female. The nests tend to be low down in the vegetation, and eggs can be laid from early May onwards. If a predator appears near the nest, adults may feign injury in an attempt to draw them away from where it is hidden.

Eyes peeled then! The photo is of a Reed Bunting in my garden this time last year, was taken through a double-glazed window, so it may not be the best!
