From your Rector

Does God care about General Elections?

Well, General Elections don't occur anywhere in the Bible, and there's no guidance in there on which candidate or party to vote for, but I do think God cares very much about our General Election because of the way it shapes our lives.

What does appear in the Bible is lots of teaching about how we should live together in community. The Old Testament laws were intended for the good of all people, and they created networks of care and responsibility, firstly within the family, but also for those who didn't have families like orphans, widows or those from another country.

'When you are harvesting in your field and you overlook a sheaf, do not go back to get it. Leave it for the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow, so that the Lord your God may bless you in all the work of your hands.' Deuteronomy 24:19

'If anyone is poor among your fellow Israelites in any of the towns of the land the Lord your God is giving you, do not be hardhearted or tightfisted toward them. Rather, be openhanded and freely lend them whatever they need.' Deuteronomy 15:7-8

There are harsh words for those who abuse their power or privilege, and the Israelites are reminded that their experience of slavery and exile should cause them to be gracious, generous and merciful to others.

Jesus taught about loving our neighbours, and even our enemies, and he lived as a model of compassion and service: he was interested in and spent time with those whom society considered the least such as women and children, the lepers and mentally ill. He told his followers that if anyone asked for a shirt, they should give them a coat as well and taught that

'whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' Matthew 25:40

God cares about justice and righteousness and calls his people to care about these things too - to do and to support doing right, the things which are fair and which lead to everyone's flourishing.

'He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? ' Micah 6:8

So as we think about how to cast our vote, perhaps those are helpful principles to bear in mind - to vote for those who we believe will act justly and kindly.


Prayer

From your outgoing St Nicholas churchwarden, Carole



Well done Year 6 pupils. We are so proud of you.


All that remains is for us to wish you a very happy summer and we look forward to being able to share some special news from Mrs Madge on our return in September.

The bird population has varied over the years, from one goose to four, with occasional visits by ducks, who seem to be welcomed by the geese. Recently we have been visited by a pair of small Canada geese, who seem to have nested in the undergrowth and brought forth six or more ducklings.

We Have the Power to Put Things Right

Disclaimer: The views in this article are reflective of the writer and not the views of The Grapevine Magazine or the Benefice of Rural East York.

Dunnington's nature is in decline. The BTO's Birds on Your Doorstep details for Dunnington list our lost species including woodcock, nightjar and turtle dove, and our declining species including greenfinches and yellowhammers, cuckoo and curlew. According to Yorkshire Wildlife Trust's 'State of Yorkshire's Nature' report, nearly 1 in 5 species in the region have declined by more than 25% in the last 20-30 years! We know climate change forms a part of that picture; York's temperature trends for Show Your Stripes Day are sobering. The Climate Crisis is here, and the Eco Emergency is real.

Some solace can be found from info on public opinion in York Outer from the Climate Coalition (members include the WI). In our constituency, 63% support net zero, 56% consider climate change a high priority and 65% would be less favourable towards the Conservatives if they weakened climate policies.

At the time of writing, we have candidates for Labour, Lib Dems, the Green Party and the Conservatives. The 'They Work for You' web site provides info on all MPs, including voting summaries. They've categorised the content so you can choose issues of interest to you. Here, you can find voting records for all current MPs to find their views on the topics that matter to you, including environmental issues.

The manifestos for each party are available online and here you can see if each party have pledged to take action on climate issues. You can ask all candidates to do so at https://action.zerohour.uk/york-outer#bill. If eco issues are of interest to you, you could also sign up with Vote Climate (https://voteclimate.uk/) which ranks the parties' manifestos and then offers information on how to maximise your climate impact with your vote.

We need nature now more than ever before; we need nature's pollinators, recyclers and pest controllers. This web of life is connected to our health, the economy, food security and more ... Our politicians hold so much power over what happens next. If you want sustainable energy, nature-friendly farming and sewage-free seasides and rivers, your vote is your chance to make an impact.

Protect yourself from investment scams

- Consider that if an individual or organisation contacts you randomly about an investment opportunity, it is likely to be either a scam or an investment carrying high risk.
- If you receive a cold call offering an investment, do not engage in conversation, but instead end the call by either disconnecting straight away, or after saying "No thanks, I'm not interested." If you receive an online or text communication about an investment, ignore it and if it's an email, delete it. Do not click on any links or attachments.
- If you are suspicious that an approach about an investment has been made by a fraudster, contact the FCA Consumer Helpline on 0800 111 6768 or using its reporting form.

Friends of Hagg Wood

We have had a very busy time recently. Our last working party cleared more invasive rhododendrons south of the main ride, to allow the bluebells to expand. At the end of May we welcomed back Iwan Downey, who used to be our local forester and in the year 2000 helped the children from Dunnington Primary School to create the Millennium area of Hagg Wood. He is now the Project Manager of the White Rose Forest project to help develop community forests across Yorkshire, with the matra "The Right Tree in the Right Place for the Right Reason". One pressing reason is the urgent need to tackle climate change through locking up more carbon dioxide in trees and timber products. Whilst the Climate Change Committee has set a national target to plant 30,000 ha of trees per year, more progress is needed to achieve this target. Lessons can also be learnt from the ReWilding project that balances trees and nature at the Broughton Sanctuary estate near Skipton.

On Saturday 1st June we enjoyed our successful Celebration to commemorate the recognition of the Forestry Track as a Public Right of Way. In the Sports Club, Dunnington Community Choir led by Vanessa created a lovely atmosphere with some wonderful songs, followed by musicians Tim and Caroline, accompanied by John Maggs on his soft whistles acquired in Orkney. Meanwhile lots of children came to the wood to enjoy a fun quiz created to give them more knowledge of the wood. We would like to thank the admirable cub leaders, Stephen Clarke and Pam Reed and their helpers, and the parents who brought the children - they were all very well-behaved, enthusiastic and fun, a real delight, and they nearly all came back to the Sports Club for prizes and refreshments. We were also able to show a video of our Community Woodland Celebration in 2003 and our 10th Anniversary Party in 2006. The whole occasion was a very happy community event and we'd like to thank everyone who was involved. We realised how lucky we are to live in such a beautiful village with such scope for a strong community spirit.

Revised bus timetable



York Charity 'York Wheels Ltd.' ended on 31st December 2023.

The Dial and Ride bus service provided travel options for York residents who are elderly or disabled and have no other means of travelling. It offered a door-to-door service where drivers assist passengers with their shopping. Buses were equipped for people who have difficulty walking and for those who use wheelchairs.

Rob Atkinson, Chair of the York Wheels Ltd.'s Trustee Board said,

"It is a matter of deep regret that the Dial and Ride service has become unsustainable in recent months. Put simply, we have reached the point at which as a result of problems with maintenance and third-party suppliers, our fleet is not up to the standards required to maintain the quality or reliability of the service, despite a helpful grant from City of York Council earlier this year.

We recognise that this will be distressing for some customers, but we'd like to reassure them that we will maintain our volunteer car driver scheme where customers can book a car in advance to collect them and take them to their destination. We encourage all our customers to make use of that alternative help. The charge for that service depends on the distance travelled. To book ring 01904 630080."

NORMANDY 1944 - THE 'FALLEN' OF DUNNINGTON

Two of the men on the war memorials of our four linked parishes died in Normandy. Both were from Dunnington. They died in the same battle area, just two days apart and only a mile or two from each other.

The first of these was **Arthur Lacy Drury**, who was born on Christmas Day 1911. Named after his father, he was the youngest child of Arthur Drury and Martha Gertrude Brown, who had married in 1903 in St Nicholas Church. He joined three sisters and one brother. Early in 1940, Arthur married Sarah Brewster and they lived in Dunnington. They had a son, Robin, who was born in 1941.

After the evacuation from Dunkirk in 1940, Britain needed many recruits in order to build bigger and stronger armed forces to protect our country and, with allies, to defeat Nazi Germany. Arthur 'signed up' in December 1940, and joined the Royal Engineers in 1941 while Robin was still an infant.

Soldiers in the Royal Engineers are known as 'Sappers' because of the work they originally did – such as digging trenches and bunkers, digging underground, building or repairing roads and bridges, and laying mines or otherwise using explosives.

Arthur became 2132926 Sapper A.L. Drury, and by 1944 he was in the 13th Field Squadron R.E., which was part of the 11th Armoured Division. During the Normandy Invasion which began on D-Day, they arrived by Landing Ship at Gold Beach on the 14th of June, and were ashore with all their vehicles by next day.

On 28th June they were working on the roads about nine miles inland, towards the city of Caën where there was a large force of heavy German tanks with powerful guns. There was fierce fighting throughout their battle area, during which Arthur was killed – just two weeks after landing in France. He was aged 32.

Arthur's grave is in the Saint Manvieu Cemetery, near Cheux in France. He is named on the British Normandy Memorial, and on the WW2 War Memorial in St Nicholas Church.



THE BIRDS IN YOUR GARDEN



Chiffchaffs

You may not think of the Chiffchaff as a garden bird, and as insectivores they are not visitors to feeding stations, but they are around. Their call, which gives them their name, can be heard quite widely. Thet are little olive-brownish birds, about the size of a Blue Tit, with a bit of an eye stripe and a tendency to wag their tails. Their repetitive song easily gets lost in the background of tits, robins and finches.

Chiffchaffs are most often found in parks and gardens in the spring as they move towards their breeding grounds, but as conditions warm and their numbers increase, they are appearing in gardens more regularly and are more and more to be heard, and occasionally seen, through the summer. I heard them just yesterday. Come autumn (who said it feels like autumn now?) they will often join flocks of finches searching for food.

One of several leaf warblers in the UK, Chiffchaffs are among the first of our small migrants to arrive and start singing, usually in early March, though as the climate warms, more and more are staying the winter, initially in the southern half of the country, but more recently around here too. They are visually very similar to the amber listed and increasingly rare Willow Warblers, and unless they are considerate enough to sing, you'll likely have

problems telling them apart. (I just assume it's a Chiffchaff, not having seen a Willow Warbler in many a year). The Willow Warbler produces a beautiful ascending and descending series of trills, a real contrast to the Chiffchaff's two metronomic notes..

Lord Grey captured the essence of the species "Alone of all the warblers, the Chiffchaff has given us the right to expect him in March: he is the forerunner of the rush of song -birds that is on its way to us and will arrive in April, and thereafter enrich our woods, meadows and gardens with still further variety and quality of song. This is why the first hearing of a chiff-chaff moves us so each spring. He is a symbol, a promise and assurance of what is to come"

Chiffchaffs breed throughout England and are found in woodland edge and scrub habitats, favouring the tops of trees and bushes. They are insectivorous, and prefer leaf insects such as caterpillars, gnats and midges. Heavy rain can cause them problems in the breeding season, as it tends to wash much of their prey off the leaves.

Their ancient-Greek based family name Phylloscopus means "leaf explorer", given because they tend to feed on the undersides of leaves where aphids congregate due to the build-up of sugary sap. They are also keen on flies, and so good is

their aerial performance, that they can happily feed in mid-flight. Their species name Collybita refers to their song, being a corruption of the Greek kollubistes or 'money-changer', as the repeated notes were thought to resemble the jingling of coins.

There are generally two broods per year with the female building a dome-shaped nest, often located near the ground in tall grass, bushes or wall-creeping plants. The females also do most of the feeding whilst the males sing to defend their territory! Ears peeled.
