Sometimes they contain erudite teaching and pearls of wisdom and sometimes they can be a rich source of amusement and indulgent pleasure. I think I prefer the latter! What I mean by this is the way in which well-intentioned authors unintentionally provide multiple meanings to notices penned in Parish magazines. Here are a few of my favourites.....

'The fasting and prayer conference this coming Sunday will include a meal.'

'This morning's sermon: Jesus goes to the wilderness. This evening's sermon: Searching for Jesus.'

'Ladies, don't forget about the bring-and-buy sale. It's a chance to get rid of those things not worth keeping. Do bring your husbands.' (Rightly so, you just COULDN'T get away with that one these days!)

'Don't let worry kill you, let the church help.' (Has to be my all-time favourite!)

'The sermon tonight, "What is hell?" Come early and listen to the choir practice.'

I hope these little gems had you chortling as they did me! As jovial as they are, there is a serious connotation to them. It is all too easy to say something that can be taken the wrong way and can upset and hurt others if we are not careful to think before we

speak. We will have all heard the saying I'm sure, 'Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me!' Well, I disagree. Words can be very powerful indeed and need to be very carefully chosen if we are not going to cause hurt, upset and offence that may cause enduring damage. Maybe that's why I love this ancient prayer:

God be in my head, and in my understanding; God be in my eyes, and in my looking; God be in my mouth, and in my speaking; God be in my heart, and in my thinking; God be at my end, and at my departing. Source: Attributed to 'Old Sarum Primer', also attributed to Pynson's Horae, 1514

Dear friends,

This feels rather strange to write, but on Sunday 10th April it was announced that I shall be leaving our group of parishes in the summer and taking up a new role. The strangeness is mixed with sadness as we have shared the life of these communities for the past 13 years, and this is where our children have grown up.

I have been appointed by Archbishop Stephen to the role of Diocesan Adviser for Vocations, based in York, but covering the whole diocese – Tees to Humber, East Coast to the A1, roughly. The role is one that I have been covering for the past year, since a colleague went on sick leave, but I have been involved in the work of vocations for the past decade. Walking alongside those who feel a sense that they are called to more, to do or be more, whether as a priest, deacon, Reader, or as a trained and recognised lay person working in a secular context.

Vocation is not something that is only the preserve of the religious. Rather I believe that the tradition brings a great wisdom to discerning how we live our lives in all their fulness. Where is that point at which our gifts, passions, experience, training and aptitude meet, and where they are put to the service of others? Some of the people who are most convinced of their calling to priesthood are also the ones most clearly and evidentially unsuited to the role. But then there are a million things out there for which I am an ill-fit. My vocation does not need to be my occupation, even though that may be the case. A vocation may be lived out as a hobby, a volunteer, a gift to others, a part-time role, a hidden service.

Over the past years we have moved from the already complex process of discernment, in order to distinguish between this and that, to a process of discernment and formation. We work with people for them to be on a path of intentional growth – as humans, in experience, in depth, self-awareness, and in spirit. Perhaps this is something we all aspire to – to live fuller, deeper lives which are not simply in the service of our own existence, but held in all their richness of gift and meaning.

My final service is likely to be on 10th July. It has been the greatest privilege to serve the people of these parishes, not simply those who worship in their churches. I hope to be able to say a proper farewell to many of you before we leave.

A Quiet Space

Review of Introduction to Meditation Course

This short course on learning how to meditate and relax was held over three consecutive Tuesday evenings in February.

It was led by the Revd Peter Moorhouse and Carole White. Peter has been organising a monthly Christian Meditation Group for over eight years now, following a sermon he preached about the benefits of meditation as prayer, and its beneficial effects on our general wellbeing. He also ran meditation groups for prisoners for eleven years when he was a prison chaplain, working with the help of the Prison Phoenix Trust <u>https://www.theppt.org.uk/</u> Carole White, a retired Occupational Therapist has been attending the Christian Meditation Group since its inception. She has contributed to the group her knowledge of relaxation skills built up over her years of practice, and her experience in meditation.

It was thought that as there has been a lot of publicity recently about the benefits of meditation and relaxation, that we would like to offer to the community a free opportunity to learn about the techniques of meditation and relaxation. As this is a beneficial practice and does not need to be linked to any religious or spiritual practice, we wanted to ensure that we were clear that it was non-religious and we would welcome participants of any faith or none.

The course was over-subscribed and we have kept the details of those who we were unable to accept (or who had to drop out at the last moment due to health issues) as we are intending to re-run the course again.

The 3 sessions lasted approximately an hour each time. The information covered the principles of meditation and a variety of relaxation techniques including mindfulness were introduced as a lead into sitting quietly for increasing lengths of time. The first session involved a 'sit' of 5 mins, the second a 'sit' of 10 mins and at the last session we sat for 20 mins. Siting positions and difficulties engaging with the process were discussed with members of the group contributing helpful suggestions.

The feedback from the participants has been very positive and we are hoping that they will all continue to try and incorporate a regular period of meditation into their daily lives.

Feedback from those who participated included:

Thank you both for your kindness and amazing support welcoming me into the church of St Nicholas, a very fitting and peaceful place to learn to meditate

Emphasizing there is no right or wrong, but just practice, helped.

[Finding] That the <u>process</u> for meditation is simple: "Just sit and concentrate on breathing" is exactly what I had hoped for. I would have been cautious to adopt an operation containing multiple steps that had to be learned and remembered. This appealing simplicity also gave me confidence that I was embarking upon something achievable, albeit new and potentially challenging

The church provides an ideal space for peaceful reflection, away from unwanted distraction

So, Peter and I have been gratified by the support and positive responses to the course. As with all meditative practice we did not look for success or failure, but welcomed the experience!

Bee Friendly Trail – Time to Sow Some Seeds

Dunnington Green Initiatives Group (GIG) is helping St Nicholas Church to organise a Bee Friendly Trail - like a scarecrow trail but with bee-friendly blooms and bee-based decorations/ displays for 23rd-24th July with a plants & crafts sale on Saturday 9th July. Both events will be not-for-profit fundraisers.

We hope this will be a really enjoyable community event and we've been busy bees helping our children's groups/settings to get involved. We'd like as many residents, groups and businesses as possible to join in with a display over the trail weekend – this might be as simple as a potted sunflower by the front door with a homemade bee for decoration. Whether displaying or not, kids can also take part in an art competition – see July issue for details.

For budget-friendly options, how about ...

- checking if you already have a pollinator-friendly plant at the front or in a moveable pot;

- sharing a seed packet for some easy-to-grow plants such as feverfew or pot marigolds (e.g. Dean's Garden Centre have Calendula for £1.55);

- cadging a cutting from a friend;
- sowing seeds for a colourful bed of annuals (e.g. cornflowers or echium vulgare or fiddleneck);
- coordinating with friends to buy a batch for a discount; and
- clubbing together for a bag of compost (climate-friendly peat-free will be marked as such). For more cost-effective ideas, see June & July issues.

The Bumblebee Conservation Trust offers a lot of help online. Why not step up for nature by pledging to Bee the Change at <u>https://www.bumblebeeconservation.org/beethechange/</u>?

Unfortunately, many plants are just not 'drinkable' (e.g. most traditional bedding plants) so the most important thing is to make sure your participating plant is pollinator-friendly. The BCT has a quick search tool for checking this (Flower Finder <u>https://</u>

<u>beekind.bumblebeeconservation.org/home.php</u>). Alternatively, look for the RHS's 'Plants for Pollinators' logo (bee in a circle) on labels/descriptions.

Friends of Hagg Wood

May is that lovely time of year when Spring leads into Summer and lifts our spirits. The continuing lengthening daylight hours and the increasing sun's heat benefits the flourishing of nature and our well-being. June is lovely, but by the time of the solstice, it could be downhill until Christmas again!

This month is arguably the most colourful and all of this palette of colours can be enjoyed in Hagg Wood. As many have appreciate over the past years, we are fortunate to have the wood in our locality. Bluebells and celandines will be with us for a while longer, but we must make sure we enjoy them while we can. We have also had magnificent displays of primroses and of wood anemones, another Ancient Woodland Indicator species that confirms our historical inheritance that we must protect from modern challenges. In addition we welcome the return of migrating birds. All bird species seem to sing louder at this time of year and especially at dawn, with territory and attracting a mate no less important. The Dunnington Cuckoo may not have been heard last year, unless you know differently, so let's hope that this time we are not disappointed.

The Friends of Hagg Wood have not been active with regard to conservation working parties for quite a while but we hope that this will become more possible before too long. It remains important to preserve the integrity, attractiveness and availability of this habitat for posterity and for the sake of wildlife, as well as for our own enjoyment. Woodlands can offer multiple benefits to many stakeholders, such as local residents, wildlife and Forestry England, given the right conditions. However, as with climate change, these can be more difficult to achieve if these conditions do not prevail.

More Biodiversity Initiatives for 2022

After the overwhelmingly positive feedback we received last year about the wild flower beds on Intake Lane Green, the Parish Council will continue its efforts to promote greater biodiversity around the village.

Thanks to a free hedge pack to support wild life from the Woodland Trust, planting in Julia's Garden and part of the Millennium Garden has just been completed. We are grateful to volunteers from Dunnington in Bloom and Treemendous for their help with this.

Eagled-eyed residents may have spotted some markings on the grass at the Millennium Garden and the village green at Greenside. There are plans for some new beds at Greenside which will be planted with a low growing mix of wild flowers.

The height of the beds on Intake Lane last year came as a surprise, thanks to an abundance of Cosmos. We will be asking the seed supplier not to include this in future mixes. The existing beds will be lightly raked and a few annual seeds added to them. Last year's perennial plants are already coming through.

Millennium Garden has had a bit of a tidy up and a few extra shrubs have been planted in an enlarged bed which backs on to the allotment, thanks to Dunnington Conservation Group. The main grass area behind the benches will be planted as a wild flower meadow with an 80% grass and 20% wild flower mix. Walking paths will be cut all around this area and the marked sections around the oak trees will be left as they are to protect tree roots. Once this meadow has established, some paths will also be cut through the main area.

Thanks are also due to the Hassacarr team who have been busy 'recycling' some of the wood chippings from recent tree work and the larger sections of a fallen tree will be left for wildlife. You'll see what they've been up to next time you have a walk round the big pond. Please help the team by keeping dogs on a lead as it is now nesting season.

We are grateful to our ward councillors who have agreed to ward grants which will support these initiatives.

Look out for another local scheme organised by the Green Initiatives Group called the Bee Friendly Trail, planned for July.

And now, a request to all residents – if you are planting a wild flower patch in your garden, or in pots this year, the Parish Council would love to have your photographs to add to the wild flower gallery on their website, which can be found here: https://dunningtonparishcouncil.gov.uk/galleries/wildflowers

Dog Fouling in Dunnington

The issue of dog fouling around Dunnington and the number of dog poo bags that are just left abandoned on the side of roads, paths, hung in hedges and up in trees is of increasing concern once again. There are dedicated dog poo bins in the village and unless the dog owner picks it up, who else will? Whilst we hope that all dog owners carry a supply of dog poo bags with them, residents may have noticed that there are dog poo bag dispensers around the village so that owners can help themselves to ONE bag at a time in an emergency. This initiative was first proposed a number of years ago by the In Bloom Team who work very hard to keep the village looking beautiful - and yet they are still finding abandoned dog poo bags, as are the volunteer team at Hassacarr.

These bags are bought by the Parish Council from the precept to help residents when you've forgotten to bring a bag. Sadly, we have received reports of individuals taking away handfuls of bags despite the notice on the dispenser requesting that only one is taken, so we will be monitoring the amount used this year.

Come on Dunnington - let's pick it up, use the dog poo bins and keep our village clean.

THE BIRDS IN YOUR GARDEN

The Great Tit



We are all used to our pets having distinct personalities, but how often do we think about birds showing the same traits? If you garden or put out supplementary food close to your house, you'll probably have found that some birds are more daring than others, venturing close to you to grab a tasty morsel, be it a worm or a currant. But what about their behaviour in the wild? Most bird activity has something to do with survival, so do they show similar personality traits, and if so, why?

Scientists have become increasingly interested in the personalities of birds, and Great Tits, which are more easily studied than most species, have often been used as a model for behavioural research. They can't be asked to fill out a questionnaire or to undertake psychometric tests, so their personalities have to be inferred from their observed behaviour. Thus, individual birds have been classed as fast, slow or intermediate speed explorers by researchers, as this trait has been found to correlate with aggressiveness, boldness and risk-taking. Personality traits have been found to be consistent in individual Great Tits and heritable within families, and do not appear to be determined by age, body condition or sex.

Under different environmental conditions, it seems that opposing personality traits can be beneficial. For example, beechmast, an important winter food source for Great Tits, as well as many other birds, crops in cycles, which has the effect of limiting the population of the many animals and birds which feed on it. Lean years reduce populations so that in boom years there is some seed left over to germinate. In winters when beechmast is abundant, competition between Great Tits is reduced, but increases when competing for breeding territories in the spring, because more birds survive. The outcome is that fast exploring adult males and slow exploring adult females tend to have the highest survival rates in boom years and the opposite occurs in years when beechmast is less abundant.



But why does this happen?

Female Great Tits are subordinate to males in winter feeding flocks, so for them, being an aggressive, fast explorer is likely to be most beneficial when winter food is scarce as they will find more food and be more likely to survive.

The dominant males have better access to food than females, and as a result, in good mast years with a high survival rate, there will be lots of rival males competing for a limited number of territories in spring, when the fast exploring male is more likely to succeed. This means that in some years it pays to be an aggressive, fast exploring bird, while in others it does not. This variability promotes the preservation of different personality types within the population. Interestingly, Great Tits with intermediate personality types have been found on average, to have both greater breeding success and higher life expectancy – so perhaps being somewhere in the middle is best! Whatever the reasons, it serves to maintain a good level of genetic variation within the population, which has to be a long-term advantage.

It is not yet clear, however, why fast exploring adults of either sex experience lower survival rates than slow exploring adults in some years. Clearly, there is a cost to being a fast explorer, all of which goes to show how much more research is needed!

Most of this work has been carried out in woodland areas, often using birds that have been ringed or tagged so that they can be identified. Insufficient research has been done in urban or suburban areas to know whether the same applies there.
