

Climate Change

A reflection by Rev Mark Poole

Dear all,

As the Grapevine goes to print, you will be aware that the 26th gathering of the 'Conference of Parties' known as COP26 will be underway. The parties comprise the 197 member nations of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).

This year it is being hosted by the United Kingdom in Glasgow's Scottish Events Campus (SEC) between 31st October and 12th November.

COP26 is a year later than scheduled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This gives the otherwise annual conference added occasion, both from the point of view of learnings from this unprecedented period, and a re-sharpening of climate goals following COP25 in Madrid in December 2019.

Disappointingly, COP25 ended inconclusively. Resolutions were passed around cutting greenhouse gases and aid for poor countries already feeling the effects of climate change. But the issue of carbon markets remained in disagreement and was deferred to the Glasgow summit.

The UNFCCC has identified four broad goals in its manifesto for COP26: secure global net zero by mid-century and keep 1.5 degrees within reach; adapt to protect communities and natural habitats; mobilise finance and work together to deliver.

It is easy to feel overwhelmed and hopeless by the ticking time-bomb of the impending climate crisis. It is all too easy to ignore it hoping it will just 'sort itself out.' Well, it won't. But there is reason to hope.

I recently attended a presentation given by Revd Jan Nobel, the Green Ambassador for York diocese, 'How to Talk to Greta Thunberg about God.' Greta is the young Swedish environmental activist known for challenging world leaders to take immediate action for climate change mitigation. Jan's talk was inspirational and challenging. It made me feel very uncomfortable. But it also gave me hope as Jan argued convincingly that if collaborative and individual action is taken globally and locally then we can prevent disaster and preserve this planet for future generations. The Church must be a leading force in climate change. Saving the planet is the mission of God and the good news of the Gospel for the twenty-first century, not least for our younger generation.

I am delighted that the PCC of St Nicholas church has approved permission for a working party to achieve the Eco Church Award. As a local church we are serious

about mission and discipleship. We are serious about justice for the planet. We are serious about climate change. We are serious about taking action.

Integrity

Friends,

In the news, as I write, there is much about the leaked 'Pandora Papers'; over 10 million leaked documents that reveal the hidden wealth, money laundering and tax avoidance by some of the world's richest and most powerful people. Kings, prime ministers and presidents,

not to mention many politicians, are among those noted in the papers, along with their transgressive financial affairs. Millions, billions even, being syphoned off into secret, anonymous companies, where money goes missing and companies hide their wealth.

Firstly, there is something of the general outrage from the public that those in the public eye behave in such ways. Then, I suspect, an air of resignation when we register no surprise. Benefit or tax fraud can lead to a fine of thousands of pounds and months in prison, levied against those at the bottom of the financial ladder. But hide a few million from the taxman, and you are likely to also be able to afford a protective wall of accountants and lawyers, as well as the shield of political clout.

Of course this is unjust, and of course this has always been thus, but our instinct is to want to expect better. Deceitful is the person who flashes their smile and then conceals their money. Dishonourable is the person who flaunts their public-facing virtue, but veils their vice. And perhaps that is what irritates and annoys us so much – that integrity seems to be a rare commodity in those who have much in their pockets. The simple disconnect between the outer and inner person: the pretence of sainthood and the practice of vice. Integrity is not about being perfect, but being transparent, and which of us dares to that? To understand someone's priorities, preferences and weaknesses in life, one would only need to examine their bank statements. May the one without moral shade cast the first paper-based financial summary.

The Greek myth of Pandora tells of how, once the box was opened out of curiosity, untold physical and emotional curses were released upon the world. The revelation of these particular papers are more of a parable about humankind in the modern age, where wealth and privilege exempt one from irritating laws and limitations, and noone manages to rouse themselves into shock any more. It also tells of human weakness, of corruption through power and wealth, and the disintegration of the human spirit. If 'the love of money is the root of all evil', then hopefully generosity and integrity might offer a salve.

Our church life was thrown into turmoil when our buildings were ordered to shut and public worship was stopped. When everything we knew was taken away, we had to think carefully about what our worship was for.

As life returns to something more like normal, we are searching for ways to use the lessons we learned during lockdown. At St Nicholas Dunnington, we're looking to adapt the worship we offer on a Sunday morning. As a church, we believe that we are loved and welcomed by God. We believe that in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, God has shown us the depth of that love. We believe that we are called to welcome others as we have been welcomed, supporting one another through the sorrows and joys of life.



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
New Readers to minister in the Diocese of York

The Dean of York, Bishop Jonathan Frost, admitted eight new Readers to serve in parishes in the Diocese of York, during a service in York Minster on Saturday 16th October.

Readers (often identified by the blue scarf worn with their robes at some services) are unpaid lay ministers who lead acts of worship, and help reach others with the good news of Jesus Christ through explaining the Bible and Christian belief. Through their preaching and teaching and in their pastoral work, Readers help others grow through the Gospel message, and share in sustaining the Church's work of caring for people in Christ's name.

Those admitted on the 16th October have trained with the York School of Ministry which involves both formational training and academic study.

Bogus Callers and Distraction Burglary

Most people who call at your home will be genuine. But sometimes, people turn up unannounced, with the intention of tricking their way into your home. They are known as 'bogus callers' or 'distraction burglars', whose only aim is to get into your home by distracting you to steal money or valuables.



Bogus callers sometimes work in pairs or even teams and are often well

organised. One will distract you while the other searches the house for money or other valuables. They can be men, women or children (or often a combination). Watch out for anyone who says they are in a hurry. Don't let them pressure or confuse you.

Bogus callers may pose as water, electricity or gasboard workers, council workers or even police officers. Always ask the caller for their identification, and check it, before letting them in.

Use the phone number in the phone book, not the one on their identity card. Remember, a genuine caller will happily wait outside while you check on them by calling their organisation and or calling a family member or neighbour.

To reduce the risk of becoming a victim of this crime, remember the following four steps:

- Lock all doors even when you are at home
- **Stop** before you open the door, ask them who they are
- Chain always use a door chain or spy hole
- Check Not sure who they are? Don't open the door!

Garden Trees - Planting for Our Future

<u>utm_source=twitter&utm_medium=social&utm_campaign=SOWT&utm_content=NG</u> <u>O</u>), concludes that our tree cover is not expanding fast enough and, in particular, we need to plant more native trees. According to the Trust, trees "lock up carbon to fight climate change, improve our health, wellbeing and education, reduce pollution and flooding, and support people, wildlife and livestock".

Dunnington GIG, together with Treemendous York, is running a scheme to help Dunnington residents who would like a garden tree. Residents will be able to choose from a selection of attractive, wildlifefriendly, native trees suitable for small gardens for a small donation to cover costs. Hassacarr Nature Reserve

This has been another challenging year for the wildlife at Hassacarr Local Nature Reserve trying to adapt to our ever changing climate - for example frogs and dragonflies were both two weeks late emerging. However frogs seem to have had a successful year with many adult and young being seen in the meadows; unmown grass seems to be vital to the survival of this species, offering food and shelter in the summer months. Dragonflies had a below average year. We recorded fewer damselflies on the wing, a surprise on the 8th September were two black darters at the Dragonfly pond, they normally frequent heathland pools at Strensall and Skipwith Commons. This was only our fourth record of this species. Hoverflies had an excellent year with many species recorded some with names such as batman, tiger and marmalade. Wasps, masonry and bumble bees also enjoyed a good year new finds for the reserve were a Darwin wood and a bee wasp.

We had our best ever year for orchids with 24 common spotted, 4 bees, 1 pyramidal plus a new one for the reserve, a southern marsh orchid. Our rare tubular water dropwort put on a splendid show as did plants such as snowdrops, common centaury, birds foot trefoil, yellow rattle and greater knapweed just to mention a few.

Tawny owls once again raised at least two young, robins, song thrush, tree creeper, blackcap, chiffchaff and long tailed tits were all seen with newly fledged young, however the unseasonal weather in the spring meant that great and blue tits raised fewer young.

Wintering birds included little egret, grey heron, barn owl, fieldfare, redwing, redpoll and siskin, the feeders attracted 45 tree and 30 house sparrows, 21 yellowhammers plus chaffinch, greenfinch, robin, dunnock and titmice.

If you would like to volunteer to help preserve this wildlife rich reserve please get in touch - you would be most welcome, we meet at the reserve at 10.00 am on a Wednesday and once a month on the third Sunday, we also would like someone to help us organise events mainly for children.

Eastfield Lane Planning Application - 20/01626/FULM

The City of York Council gave consent to this planning application for 83 dwellings on Green Belt land at their Planning Committee meeting on Thursday 7 October 2021.

The consent was based on the fact that they maintained there were very special circumstances to allow this development to take place on Green Belt land despite the fact that the Local Plan and the Neighbourhood Plan have yet to be determined.

The so called very special circumstances can be found on the Parish Council website and notice board on York Street.

The Parish Council spoke at the meeting against the planning application along with one of our Ward Councillors, Cllr Martin Rowley. Our other Ward Councillor, Cllr Mark Warters, who is on the Planning Committee also voted against the planning application. Cllr Warters did try and get the planning application deferred pending the outcome of the Local Plan but was defeated.

We understand that this is the first time the City of York Council has given consent for such a development in the Green Belt.

The Parish Council has opposed this planning application from the start and has responded on three separate occasions to subsequent amendments. We have always maintained that the planning application was premature and inappropriate development in the Green Belt and that there were no very special circumstances to allow this to happen. However regardless of this the City of York Council seemed determined on railroading this planning application through.

This means that the City of York Council has allowed development in the Green Belt to happen and prevented democracy and the planning process from properly taking place by not allowing the Local Plan and Neighbourhood Plan to follow due process.

We are now giving the matter due consideration.

Parish Council Tree Inspection

The Parish Council has recently commissioned a tree inspection for all trees on Parish Council land. This is in line with the Parish Council Tree and Hedgerow Management Policy which can be found on the Parish Council website.

The purpose of this inspection was to identify any risks and take early remedial action in order to conserve and enhance our trees.

Trees on Parish Council land which are in the Conservation Area are subject to a Planning Application 21/02275/TCA which can be found on the City of York website under Planning Applications.

The current work programme over the winter months is expected to begin in December and will deal with the removal of dead branches, raising the height of some tree canopies and reducing the height of others, clearing vegetation around streetlights and further safety checks of cavities and tree brace systems.

Work in the conservation area includes The Green, Common Road, Intake Lane Green, opposite the play park and Julia's Garden.

The other areas are the Play Park where a couple of trees will be crown lifted above the play equipment; Hassacarr Local Nature Reserve where some dead branches will be removed and a group of dead elms which will be reduced in height but left in place to support wild life; the Playing Fields will also require some work on an Ash tree which will be organised by the Playing Fields Association.

This is the first stage of a three-year tree maintenance programme.
