Holi-days

A reflection by Rev Dr John Schofield

Dear All,



Normally for me August is a quiet month. It is a time when schools have broken up, and my responsibilities in my role as Chaplain to the university and elsewhere mean I have fewer demands on my time. It is a typical time for people to go away on holiday. As Covid-19 restrictions have lifted many are taking the opportunity to go away somewhere. The news has reported that the 'staycation' is very popular this year – and holiday resorts throughout the country are warning that they have received record bookings. There will be larger crowds than normal.

Holidays are called holi-days because they used to be times when holy days were celebrated. The normal routine and demands of work were suspended for communities to come together and celebrate one of the festivals of the Christian calendar, or a Saint's day. Now-a-days families take the opportunity to meet up and holiday together, and so the gathering together aspect of the holy days continues. Of course we still have the legacy of this in Christmas and Easter, as times when schools take a break, and so these holy days are fixed within the modern cycle of the year. And in some communities Whitsun celebrations – that is Pentecost – is a time for processions and, in Yorkshire and other part of the North of England, brass bands. The life of faith continues to influence everyone's life here, whether they know it or not.

In Jesus' day the festivals of the Jewish year dominated the activities in Jerusalem, and you can see this in the Gospels, and some of Jesus' teaching and imagery is taken from aspects of these great events of the year. But interestingly I am told that the word 'holiday' is only found in the book of Esther, and is reference to the celebration of Purim - a day of feasting and gladness (where gifts are offered to each other), but that is February/March time. So whether you are going somewhere this Summer to holiday or not – please do take the time to celebrate a time of holi-ness, and do realise that Sundays are our weekly holy days, a weekly sabbath holiday, for celebrating faith and our communities.

The myth of freedom

Friends,

Is it true that total freedom is a myth? Freedom of choice, freedom of thought, freedom of self-determination, freedom of religion?

It has always struck me as odd when a religious person, born into a particular sacred tradition and practice, proclaims that theirs is the only true path. Have they ever considered the possibility that, had they been been born in another place and into the bosom of another faith, they

may well have been shouting equally loudly from another side? It seems arrogant to think that we are so free from all constraint, and taint of time and culture.

A professor spoke to his medical students about freedom. "How free do you feel your life choices were when you decided to study medicine", he asked? "Completely", "totally", they all replied. "So tell me", the professor continues, "how many of you have parents who are doctors?". Seven or eight out of ten replied in the affirmative. "Really", their teacher went on, "Of all the choices you could have made in life, you have chosen to do exactly the same?"

Even if one were to believe that complete choice were available, it would be a mistake to confuse this with complete freedom. My son visited the wonders of the Meadowhall Shopping Centre the other day, if that may stand as an icon of Yorkshire choice. Shop after shop, food outlet after snack bar, entertainment and distraction galore. Choice is only limited by cash flow. But is this a place where I would find freedom?

The wisdom of the Tradition teaches us something different, which is learned again in every generation and stage of life: that freedom comes, not by addition but by subtraction. I can add a thousand purchases to my possession, and a thousand options in my day, but I am likely to be unable to either move or choose. True freedom only comes through limitation, submission, and the choice of a single path, person or possession. The pearl of great price is what I give all for. To possess the greatest treasure I will need to jettison the clutter and junk. The freedom of movement we admire in a ballerina only comes from years of dedication to a single discipline. The freedom of spirit that we find in a monk was only gained by them giving up everything else.

It may be crass to announce that yours is the only true path and all should follow it. But it may be true wisdom to accept that only one path can be followed by any one individual at any one time. With maturity comes surrender, with surrender comes freedom, and with freedom comes joy. The paradox of liberty is found in the decision to choose to give up our choices.

A letter from the Bishop of Whitby, the Rt Revd Paul Ferguson (1 August):

With hope and trust

I very much hope that the easing of restrictions has helped you to have a refreshing time this summer, as we all look to the future.

And it's with hope and trust in God that we come to the next important stage in our Living Christ's Story consultation with parishes. Each PCC has been invited to answer a set of consultation questions (or as many of them as you can manage) by 3 September, using the link at the foot of this page.

One of the glories of the Diocese of York is our variety. We have communities of different sizes, coastal and inland, industrial and farming ... As the Church of England from the Humber to the Tees it's our calling to be people of worship, celebration and prayer, of care and service, learning and growth, of good influence in civic life and responsibility for the environment. We'll do this differently in different places, and it's been wisely said that an effective church does a few things and does them well.

PCCs have been working hard on the consultation — thank you for everything that you have been doing, with special meetings and awaydays to look at the material. I can't emphasise too much how valuable it will be to have the answers and comments from around the diocese that will help us to move to the next stage of planning.

When we're able to look at all the responses together, it will help shape mutual and diocesan-level support, and also help to decide what can be afforded for the future.

St Paul wrote about the variety of God's gifts (Romans 12; 1 Corinthians 12) and the importance of mutual support (2 Corinthians 8-9). In that spirit, your response will be a key part of planning for effective shared mission into the future — thank you.

Yorkshire Wolds Way

After running up Snowden a couple of times, walking (and a few years later, running) the Lyke Wake Walk, and then in 2019 running home from Whitby to Dunnington, near York (50 miles), the Revd Canon Nick Bird was looking for a new challenge.

After delaying for a year due to covid, over 23/24 July he walked the Yorkshire Wolds Way from Hessle to Filey, completing the journey in 31 hours. His wife, Diane Benson, walked the first four hours with Nick, and his colleague, The Revd Mark Poole did another three, before being joined by an old friend, Jason Shearer, for the 30 mile night section.

Completing the 79 miles walk, which is a national trail threading itself across beautiful countryside, has been a long-held ambition.

Nick says,

"The blisters were all worth it to spend time in beautiful surroundings with friends and family, and to raise some money for a new roof for the St Nicholas Church extension, but please stop me if I ever suggest doing it again."

Weekday Worship via Zoom



The Archbishop talking to Diocesan Synod about praying by the Ouse stirred the memories of David Wilbourne, Chaplain to Archbishop of York John Habgood:

When I worked at Bishopthorpe, on Christmas Eve I used to steal onto the dark terraces and sit by the swollen river, thinking of all that had flowed from Bethlehem over 2000 years.

We used to finish in the office around 9.30 pm, so again I would spend a few moments sitting by the river catching my breath before going home. I was once sitting there and I was surprised by a cleric, a very ambitious one, obsessed with being a bishop, who had decided to come and see the Archbishop by night to promote his cause. In the darkness he was about to walk straight into the flooded Ouse; he never became a bishop, but at least I stopped him drowning.

You could set your watch by the Evening Press barge coming up daily with paper for the presses. We used to ring the farmer who owns the fields/ ings at the other side of the Ouse to tell him the waters were rising and his sheep were paddling. Archbishop John Habgood kept a little dingy in the cellar so he could paddle it around when the cellar was flooded to turn off the electrics and boiler. Guess things have improved since then!

The best story of course is where PM Ramsey Macdonald and Archbishop William Temple were sitting on terraces when a bargeman flowed by. 'Glad to see you're keeping better company today,' he shouted. 'I wonder which of us he means?' Temple quipped.

The 'Light A Candle Café' at St Nicholas Church is a place of support and friendship for those who have been bereaved.


